#### Education for all



• The development of the whole education system takes time. During the first years of the 20th century, only a third of rural children went to school.

- The 1921 act on compulsory education started the path towards a modern education system based on the philosophy of education for all.
- Today education from pre-primary to higher education
  is free of charge for Finns and citizens from EU/ETA
  countries. Early childhood education and care is
  subsidized.

#### Vision for continuous learning

#### How? Reform policies and progress



- Continuous learning as part of the working life

  - short-term competence services; tailored study opportunities; digital service solutions
- Ensuring the accessibility of continuous learning
  - continuous learning for everyone; advisory and guidance



## VET and continuous competence development



- Half of the Finnish students completing basic education continue to vocational education and training (VET) and half to general upper secondary training.
- Supporting lifelong learning and student's development as human being and members of society.
- Education is publicly funded and free of charge.
- Vocational education and training are held in high regard.

- Continuous competence more than half of the VET students over 20 years old
- Open pathways to higher and further education

- Flexible learning pathways
